EAC Welcomes Paul Mission Delegates from South Korea

thiopia Adventist College (EAC) was delighted to welcome a delegation of 15 representatives from South Korea on September 23, 2025, at the Bole International Airport, Addis Ababa, and subsequently on the EAC campus on September 24, 2025. The visit to EAC commenced with a warm and colorful reception organized by the EAC Church Pathfinder Club, who greeted the guests outside Toppenberg Hall with their distinctive marching formation and the presentation of elegant pink roses to each delegate. Following the heartfelt welcome, the delegation proceeded to the Conference Room for a formal reception program organized in their honor.

Mr. Pradeep Tudu, the Vice-President for Financial Affairs welcomed Elder Tae-Soon Sohn, the CEO of Paul Mission, his grandson, Choi, Do-Young (Joshua), and 13 other South Korean delegates to Ethiopia Adventist College who came primarily for site visit and the inauguration of the Ethio-Korean Friendship Cattle Farm Project.

Next, Dr. Abraham Dalu, President of EAC, presented a brief but concise progress report of the Ethio-Korean Cattle Farm Project. Dr. Dalu began with a brief history of the College from its establishment in 1947 by American/Danish missionary V.E. Toppenberg to the present where EAC is in transition to a university status. He stated, "The College desires to generate funds for

the construction of the university project— Kuyera Adventist University."

Describing the establishment of EAC/KAU Ethio-Korean Friendship Cattle Farm in Ethiopia, Dr. Abraham Dalu stated, "The initiators and developers of the project are Dr. Chunsik Park and Dr. Sang Jin Lee, professors of Sahmyook University. The Cattle Farm Project is sponsored by Paul Mission, Elder Tae-Soon Sohn, the CEO, who has generously provided the seed money in the amount of 3.1 million Ethiopian Birr for cattle barn and fence construction.

The Paul Mission team has agreed to sacrificially and generously sponsor 200-300 cattle to strengthen the historic friendship between South Korea and Ethiopia with a goal to raise 10,000 cattle in five years and establish Kuyera Adventist University. Dr. Dalu further added that a lot of planning and groundwork had been

done by the EAC Administrative team before starting the Cattle Farm Project. From Zoom meetings and assessment of the recommendations by Dr Lee and Dr. Park for the construction of the barns and fences to visitations to multiple successful local and distant cattle farms and selection of strategic sites for large open space with access to water, electricity, food production suitability, and safety for the cattle.

In addition, Dr. Dalu stated the administrators visited several agricultural training and livestock development centers and cattle farms in Oromia and Sidama region. He assured the College will continue to interact and collaborate with several government officials in Ethiopia, community leaders, livestock experts and entrepreneurs from both Korea and Ethiopia.

Dr. Dalu revealed the best location for

the Cattle Farm Project has been identified and a secure barbed-wire fence has been built around 7.5 hectares of land. The College has about 100 hectares of land for cattle feed production, grazing area, and expansion of barn construction as the number of cattle increases. Furthermore, cost effective and safe construction materials are used when possible.

Before the Korean delegates came to Ethiopia, EAC through the help of God, its alumni, and friends purchased 5 second time pregnant and 9 first time pregnant 85% Holstein Friesian cows. The range of pregnancy is between 7-8 months. One second time pregnant cow gave birth to a healthy female calf on Saturday, September 20, 2025. The calf was fondly named Sanbatee, to signify the Sabbath day when it was born. God has already

begun the work of multiplication, Dr. Abraham stated.

After giving a summary of the expenditure from the operating funds and the donations, Dr. Abraham Dalu stated cattle farm professionals were hired as full-time employees or contract employees for regular visits. A certified veterinarian is on contract agreement. Mr. Edao Shanku is the newly appointed Cattle Farm Manager, and additional cattle care givers will be assigned in the near future to support the project.

The welcome program ended with a vote of thanks by Dr. Mardianto Marpaung, Vice-President for Institutional Advancement.

thiopia Adventist College (EAC), soon to become Kuyera Adventist University (KAU), celebrated the historic inauguration of the Ethio-Korean Friendship Cattle Farm Project on September 25, 2025, in Kuyera, Shashemene. The project, developed in partnership with Paul Mission and scholars from Sahmyook University in South Korea, represents a milestone in advancing education, food security, and community development in Ethiopia.

The idea for the cattle farm was first

proposed by Dr. Chunsik Park, Professor of Old Testament at Sahmyook University, with the vision of generating sustainable revenue to support the construction of Kuyera Adventist University. In April 2025, Dr. Abraham Dalu (President of EAC/KAU) and Pr. Tadesse Adugna (President of Eastern Ethiopia Union Mission) visited South Korea for a benchmarking tour of dairy farms, accompanied by Mrs. Aster Giorgis Dalu. They were joined by Dr. Sang Jin Lee, Professor of Animal Reproduction at Sahmyook University, whose expertise

contributed to shaping the project. Together, Dr. Park and Dr. Lee became the initiators and developers of this initiative, with Elder Tae-Soon Sohn, CEO of Paul Mission, providing financial support.

The inauguration ceremony was attended by 14 Korean delegates led by Elder Sohn, alongside community members, Eastern Ethiopia Union Mission leaders, representatives from the Ethiopian Livestock Development Institute (Holeta Center), and local government officials.

In his welcoming remarks, Dr. Dalu outlined four key impacts of the project:

- For EAC/KAU: A living laboratory for teaching, research, and innovation, while generating income to support university development.
- •• For the community: Job creation, skills training, and improved nutrition through access to dairy and beef products.

Pr. Tadesse Adugna offered dedicatory remarks, emphasizing the project's role in supporting the College's transition to a university and in enhancing community food security. A dedicatory prayer was given by Prof. Abduro Suleman, President of South East Ethiopia Field.

Prof. Safawo Gullo, Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs, spoke on the overall significance of the cattle project for our institution, the surrounding community, the region and the entire country. He emphasized that EAC would be collaborating with

and receiving technical assistance from LDI (Livestock Development Institute). In addition, Prof. Safawo introduced Dr. Ararsa Duguma, Mr. Dagnachew, and Mrs. Bizunesh Magarsa, the individuals, who were instrumental to acquire the 14 pregnant cows without involving middle-men, who charge exorbitant amount of money to facilitate the purchasing of cattle.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the EAC Alumni, friends, and ECD for providing funds for the initial purchase of 14 cows and funds to cover initial incidental expenses.

Dr. Ararsa Duguma, the Director of LDI, Holeta Center delivered a very important message on LDI's commitment to collaborating with EAC/KAU on research and capacity building for the success of the new Cattle Farm Project. He also praised the commitment of the Korean donors and Ethiopian partners, noting that the project

strengthens Ethiopia-Korea relations while advancing education, research, and employment opportunities.

The ceremony featured an inaugural address by Elder Tae-Soon Sohn, followed by the unveiling of a inaugural plaque and ribbon-cutting ceremony conducted jointly by Elder Sohn, Dr. Dalu, Pr. Adugna, and Mr. Teshome Mohammed, Administrator of Melka Sirba Sub-City.

Guests toured the cattle farm, viewing the first 14 Holstein Friesian cows, with additional livestock to be purchased soon. The event concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr. Mardianto Marpaung, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, while Pr. Babiso Gemechu, Vice President for Student Affairs, served as a translator.

The Ethio-Korean Friendship Cattle Farm stands as a symbol of international collaboration and faith-driven development. It will serve as a catalyst for education, food security, and community transformation—laying a strong foundation for the future Kuyera Adventist University.

Elder Tae-Soon Sohn Speaks During Divine Service at EAC

he Ethiopia Adventist College (EAC) church and community were blessed on September 27, 2025, by a heartfelt message from Elder Tae-Soon Sohn, CEO of Paul Mission, along with other Korean quests.

In his sermon, Elder Sohn shared how meaningful encounters with people can transform lives. He recounted three pivotal meetings that have greatly shaped his journey.

The first was meeting his wife, with whom he has been married for 60 years.

She has always supported his mission trips, as have their three daughters and grandchildren. For instance, his grandson Joshua accompanied him to Ethiopia as a translator. Another grandson, inspired by a mission trip to Congo, chose to pursue a career in medicine and is now a practicing dentist in the United States

The second significant meeting was with people in Africa, which brought him immense happiness. Elder Sohn explained why he came to Africa. He owned land that he couldn't sell for 20 years, but after

fasting and praying earnestly, he made a vow to give \$100,000 to Africa if he successfully sold the land. Within three days, the land sold for \$400,000, and he honored his promise to God. Since then, he has visited countries including Kenya, Congo, Tanzania, and Ethiopia, helping communities build schools and initiate projects such as cattle farms, like the one at FAC.

His third and most profound meeting was with God. In 1961, upon entering the military, a cousin gave him a Bible. He read it diligently, along with "The Desire of Ages" by Ellen G. White. This spiritual journey led him to commit his life to God and to be baptized into the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Many church members were deeply touched and inspired by Elder Sohn's testimony and his example of relentless service and selfless living. His story reflects a life dedicated to bringing hope and the promise of eternal life—not only in this world but beyond.

n September 30, 2025, officials from Ethiopia Adventist College (EAC), soon to become Kuyera Adventist University (KAU) and FDRE Livestock Development Institute in Ethiopia (LDI) convened at Kaliti Sub-City in Addis Ababa to formalize a landmark partnership. On this historic occasion, the President of EAC/KAU, Dr. Abraham Dalu and the Director General of LDI, Dr. Asrat Tera Delebo signed an MOU. As outlined in the MOU, the bilateral partnership between the two institutions encompasses the following

joint collaborative areas: breed selection and genetic improvement, research & innovation, capacity building and training, consultancy and extension services, and resource sharing.

The responsibilities of Ethiopia Adventist College include:

a. Provide technical update training or scholarship opportunity on a yearly basis for LDI staffs if they meet admission requirements of EAC,

- b. Cover educational fee for staffs who receive such scholarships.
- Integrate the farm into its teaching and research programs.
- d. Facilitate student and staff participation in joint activities.

The responsibilities of Ethiopian **Livestock Development Institute include:**

- a. Provide technical support in areas such as animal husbandry, and breeding, etc.
- b. Lead capacity-building initiatives and research programs.
- c. Support the dissemination of best practices to farmers and industry stakeholders.

- d. Empowering EAC/KAU with laboratory equipment, materials and avail resources
- Manage students involved in field and laboratory session
- Empowering EAC/KAU animal science staff technology and experience sharing
- Give Artificial Insemination Technician Training to staffs of EAC/KAU
- h. Support Liquid nitrogen and semen supplies to the cattle farm as per necessary

This MOU signifies a strong partnership dedicated to advancing livestock development through education, research, and innovation. Together, EAC/KAU and LDI commit to fostering sustainable agricultural growth and national development.

EAC/KAU leaders also requested LLUH's assistance in sending medical students through the LLUH International Student Missionary program to serve at EAC campus in a one-year medical student missionary program, providing handson support and practical learning opportunities for KAU students.

Another highlight of the meeting was the personal connection with Dr. Anne Berit Petersen, whose father served as Business Manager at EAC and at the former Ethiopia Adventist Hospital in Addis Ababa during the 1960s. In a significant step toward expanding global collaborations, a delegation from Ethiopia Adventist College (EAC) travelled to the Philippines and Malaysia from May 1–15, 2025. The team included Pastor Tadesse Adugna (President of Eastern Ethiopia Union Mission(EEUM) and EAC Board Chair), Pastor Chali Birasa (Treasurer, South East Ethiopia Field/SEEF), Dr. Abraham Dalu (EAC President), Mrs. Aster Giorgis Dalu (Director, EAC Clinic and Health & Wellness), Dr. Mardianto H. Marpaung (Vice President for Institutional Advancement, MBA Program Coordinator, and Professor), and

Dr. Ester Karosekali (Director of Guidance and Counselling and Associate Professor). The journey of the Ethiopian delegation corresponded with the March 2025 meeting of Southern Asia-Pacific Division (SSD) officers and the Union Presidents under SSD territory.

The trip to the Philippines focused on building academic alliances and exploring educational innovations. On Monday morning, May 5, 2025, the delegation signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Adventist University of the Philippines

(AUP). The representatives of AUP were Dr. Arceli H. Rosario, the President of AUP; Dr. Gracel Ann S. Saban, the Vice President of Academic Affairs; Pastor Dr. Julio C. Dr. Worku Negash Motbainor Inspires Graduates with Romans 12 at the 43rd Graduation Ceremony

t its 43rd Graduation Exercise from June 20-June 22, 2025, Ethiopia Adventist College conferred diplomas and degrees to 172 graduates: 43 graduates from the Religion Department; 22 from the Theology Department; 48 graduates from the TVET Program; and 59 from MBA.

In his Commencement address, Dr. Worku Negash Motbainor, distinguished educator, government advisor, policy and leadership specialist, and President of Andinet International College, addressed the graduates saying, each had the capacity to positively impact their family, community, institution, church, and nation and urged them to use their God given will tactfully, deliberately, and untiringly.

As alumni of Kuyera Adventist Secondary School, he reminisced of his humble beginning as the son of an SDA pastor, his experience singing in the choir, working 17 hours a week, and his decision to be baptized as a result of a spiritual campaign coordinated by Mr. Bacchiocchi, who later became a well-known author and theologian.

He praised the graduates for their hard work and dedication and challenged them to ponder and practice the seven gems he wanted to pass on to them:

- Don't just occupy contribute. Your name should not just be on the list. You need to be registered for something worth remembering after you pass on. Be counted and leave something honorable behind. Live to leave a humble legacy at any level: family, church, community, regional, national, even at global levels.
- 2. Don't just live let live. You are not here for your own benefit alone. Do something to support your brothers and sisters, no matter where they may be. Be responsible for other beings who need your support (this means humans, the environment, institutions, the church, etc.). Give. Share. God gave you everything you have, not just for your enjoyment alone, but to make others sense the goodness of the Good Lord through you as well.
- 3. Don't just pass through plant. Plant human beings, plant relationships, plant institutions, plant trees, flowers, plants, etc. Plant life. Live for impact than salary. Draw

- your satisfaction from leaving behind a lasting impact. Think and act bigger than yourself.
- 4. You don't have to be world famous but, do something to impact your local community. It could be here in Kuyera, Negelle Arsi, Shashamanne, it could be in Wolaita, Arba Minch, it could be in Addis Ababa, Dire Dawa, or Hargri, it could be in Gondar, Bahr Dar or Mekele. Embrace the adage, "Think globally, act locally."
- 5. Teach your children and students not to be parochial - the world is better off if you teach them to be inclusive. Progress requires collaboration and solidarity harmony over discord. The current and future generation of children are more inclusive. Let us cultivate our children and students to fit-in well with the new wave of globalization.
- 6. Do not ever question that you are a precious child of the King. You are a child

of the King. That guarantees us that, in the sight of God, we are as important and as valuable as anyone else on earth. But know also that the corollary is true. Remember that just like you, your brothers, and sisters around you are also children of the King. If we witness someone wanting to act condescendingly or sense of superiority, let's be certain to distinguish that behavior as his/her problem, not ours. Not God's either.

7. Remember, humans are weak. We have gone astray from God's plan. We say and do bad things. So, make sure that you don't blame your God when your fellow humans fail you. Cultivate a persevering heart. Cling to your Maker not to what some weak individuals may say to you or about you. Just make sure you are clean in the

sight of the Lord, and that you are at peace with your God, your salvation.

The graduates would remember the parting words of Dr. Worku and the spiritual gift he gave them from Romans Chapter 12. He advised them to read this chapter often and give themselves wholly to God to be a living sacrifice each day, to use their gifts for God's glory, to love genuinely, and be ready always to help and bless others.

He reminded the graduates to not only live up to their aim and motto but also to evaluate themselves periodically to check how well they uphold their AIM: To encourage excellence, integrity, and purpose and MOTTO: Faith, Knowledge, and service for greater purpose.

Pastor Geremew Biru, President of the Western Ethiopia Union Mission (WEUM) and EAC Board member, likewise participated in the General Conference Session, accompanied by WEUM officers Pastor Belay Taye and Mr. Zemenu Zelalem, who also serve on the EAC Board. The session brought together 2,804 official delegates from across the globe.

A significant highlight of the session was

the selection of the Nominating Committee, tasked with appointing General Conference officers, department directors, and division officers. Pastor Tadesse Adugna, Pastor Geramew Biru, and Dr. Abraham Dalu were selected to serve on this committee, which comprised 277 delegates. These members were chosen through a caucus process by each of the 13 world divisions prior to the session and represented a diverse mix of leadership, including union representatives, administrators, and lay leaders.

The presence of these delegates and special guests not only strengthened the representation of the East Central Africa Division, Eastern Ethiopia Union Mission, and Ethiopia Adventist College, but also underscored the commitment of church leaders and employees to participate in global decision-making and collaborative mission planning.

Over the course of three days, the clinic welcomed an impressive 340 patients seeking care and guidance noted Mrs. Aster Dalu, Director of Health and Wellness.

The Health Expo was made possible through the dedication of both professional volunteers and clinic staff. Among them were five medical missionaries, a retired
